home built in 1825 by John Y. Hill. The home was later turned into a boarding house and run by Mr. Hill's widow, "Aunt Beck". The Hill House became well known throughout the region for its hospitality, fine food and special coffee.



The Hill House was home to General and Mrs. George Armstrong Custer from 1871-1873. General Custer's many Russian Wolfhounds and other hunting dogs often created havoc in Aunt Beck's garden.
